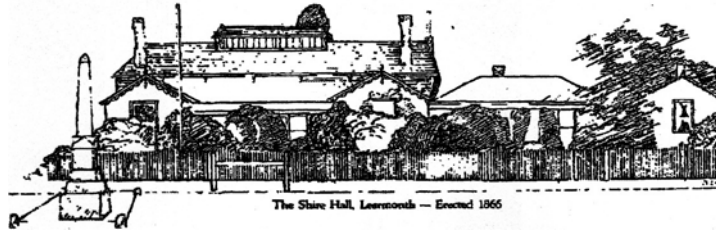

HERITAGE GRANT FOR WALKING TOUR OF LEARMONTH

The society received good news late last year, with the announcement that we had received a \$12,000 Victorian Heritage Grant for an interpretative walking tour of the township. The money will go towards research (30 sites earmarked), designing a fully explanatory brochure of the sites, manufacturing and affixing marker discs, as well as designing a website. Our local member Joe Helper met with President Ilma Bridgewater and Secretary Terry Foran and a reporter and photographer from the Courier at the Historical Society headquarters just before Christmas to make the announcement. Bill Loader was the society's driving force in making the application for the grant and we must also thank Mandy Jean, the Heritage Consultant to the City of Ballarat, for her invaluable assistance and advice in completing the application form. Obviously, this project will be a major topic for discussion at our first meeting for the year.

ALBERT JACKA V.C.

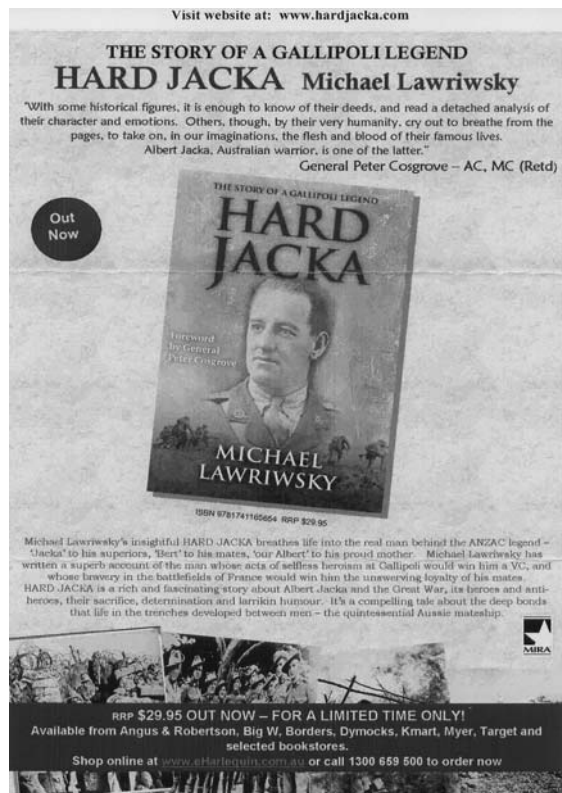
Melbourne author, Dr. Michael Lawriwsky, has released a book about Albert Jacka, "the man behind the Anzac legend".

He has written to our society, offering to give a talk about the book, complete with overhead slides. He makes this offer because Jacka served with the 14th Battalion, AIF, and many members of that battalion were from rural Victoria. We would need to make it worth his while to come here to give a talk and would be interested to hear from members who would be interested in attending. The author advises that he would prefer to do his talk on a weekend, rather than a Tuesday meeting night and it is felt this could be arranged without too much trouble. Michael Lawriwsky had an article about Albert Jacka on the editorial page of the Herald-Sun on Monday, 14th January. Not only was Albert a genuine war hero, but he later served on the Sat. Kilda Council and became Mayor of that city. Jacka Boulevard in St. Kilda is named after him and he is remembered not only for winning the VC, but also for his tireless and selfless work with the poor and

unemployed during the depression, until his life was tragically cut short in 1932 at the age of only 39.

TOO MUCH WATER IN THE LAKE!

It seems hard to believe these days that Lake Learmonth had problems with overflowing in the early days, so much so that Thomas Bath, then owner of "Ceres" wrote the following letter to the Shire of Ballarat on 7/10/1867:

"Gentlemen,

As the water in Lake Learmonth is now very high and the water still increasing, and likely to overflow and likely to do considerable damage, I beg to make the Council an offer to put in an outlet to the lake, to run off some of the surplus water.. I propose cutting a race, or drain, through some of my land and through that of Mr. Eaves on to the road between the farms of

Messrs. Rennie and Eaves, thence to the lake. For the present, I would make a very shallow outlet from the lake, but in the summer I would put in a race about 3 feet, 1.5 inches below the present surface of the lake, which would be 1 foot, 6 inches above the lowest of last summer's level. (And) I would put in a permanent culvert or bridge of stone or sustainable wood with a lock or stop for the water, of sufficient strength. During the summer, I would have the use of the water for irrigation, and would not run and water out of the lake when it is within 18 inches of the lowest of last summer's level. The Council should have the power of preventing me taking any water from the lake at any time by paying me all expenses for the work I had done on the road and culvert, and such expenses not to exceed 2 hundred pounds.
